### Gateway of India

The Gateway of India is Mumbai's most iconic landmark, a grand archway built in 1924 to mark the visit of King George V and Queen Mary. Standing 26 meters tall, this yellow basalt structure blends Indo-Saracenic architecture with Islamic and European styles. Overlooking the Arabian Sea, it offers stunning harbor views and serves as a lively hub for locals and tourists. Historically, it's where British troops exited India in 1947, marking the end of colonial rule. Today, it's surrounded by street vendors, photographers, and boats heading to Elephanta Caves, making it a vibrant starting point for exploring Mumbai.

### Marine Drive

Marine Drive, dubbed the "Queen's Necklace" for its sparkling nighttime lights, is a 3.6-kilometer promenade along Mumbai's coast. Lined with Art Deco buildings, it offers breathtaking Arabian Sea views, especially at sunset when the sky glows with color. It's a favorite for joggers, couples, and families who stroll or relax by the seawall, enjoying the city's energy.
